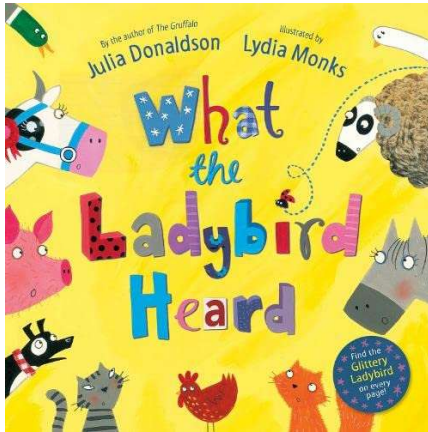


This fortnight our core book is 'What The Ladybird Heard'

Ladybird

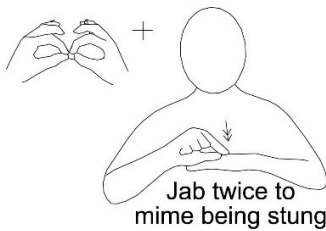
There's a ladybird in my garden. She has

loves to be.



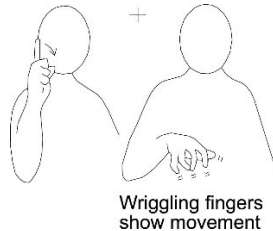
You can help your child by reading with your child every day, singing our core song together, and reciting and acting out the poem.

Makaton

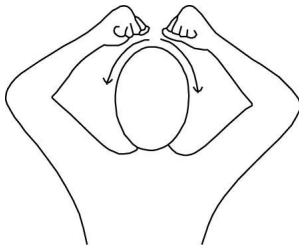
We are learning these Makaton signs:

ladybird

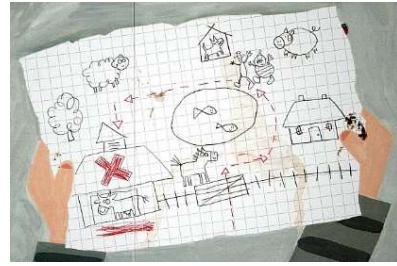

Maps and Plans



In the story there is a map which shows where all the animals live on the farm and the way to walk around the farm. Maybe you could draw a map of your home or garden or local park or your journey to nursery. Draw the main things you see on the journey or in the space you are mapping. You could even draw a map of an imaginary place and use it in your imaginary play.

Make A Seed Bomb



Wildflowers are good for bees, butterflies, and other insects. We can help these important insects by planting flowers for them. A fun way to do this is by making 'seed bombs'. It is even more fun to go to the park with the seed bombs and throw them into the bushes or grass for them to grow.

How to make a seed bomb:

1. Mix 1 small handful of wildflower seed mix with 5 small handfuls of soil.
2. Stir in a little water and mix together.
3. Roll the mixture into firm balls.
4. Leave the balls to dry in a sunny spot.
5. Take your seed bombs to the park and throw them into a muddy patch.

Go back to check on your seeds to see if they are growing.
