


Fortnight beginning 02/03/26



Jobs In The Community

We are thinking about the different jobs people have in our community - nurses, teachers, dentists, builders, firefighters - to name a few. What jobs can you find out about? What do the people who work in these jobs do?



Our parents and grandparents may have jobs too. Why not find out what they do each day. Maybe they would like to come to nursery and show us some of what they do. For example, a chef could come and help us cook and a midwife could show us how to look after babies.

Science

Science is exploring and finding out about different materials, forces and the natural world. During British Science Week, why not try some of the following science ideas:

- Make some ice and see how long it takes to melt.
- Cut open some fruit and look at the size and shape of the seeds inside.
- Use a magnet to find out what objects and materials are attracted to it.
- Look for bugs in the garden or park - what can you find out about them?
- Plant some seeds and care for them and watch them grow.
- Bake some bread and think about what is happening as the yeast makes it 'grow'.



Reading Together

We love reading. It is good to read books together in a group with friends or snuggled up with someone on the sofa or just quietly by ourselves. You can read almost anywhere - on the bus, whilst eating breakfast, in the bath. Books don't need batteries and they are small and fit in your bag. Books can go wherever you go. As we celebrate World Book Day, we want to encourage you to read and share story and information books from home, the library and nursery.
